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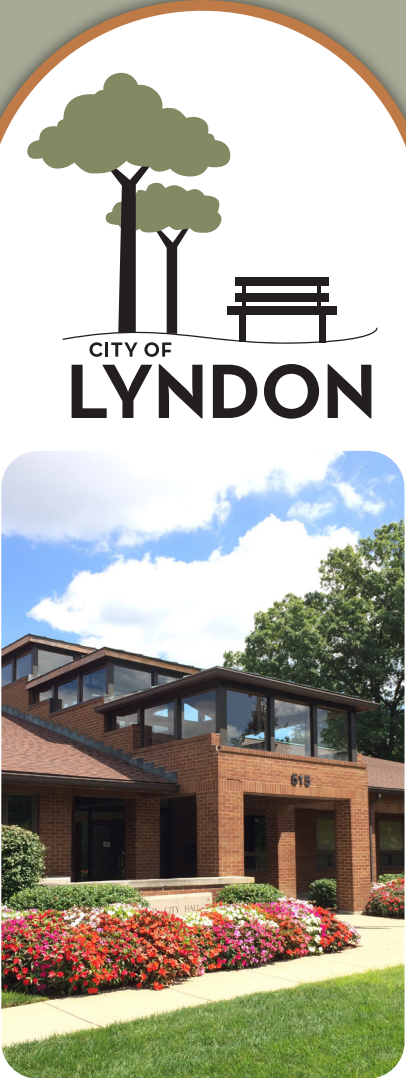

## MAYORS MESSAGE

While preparing our annual budget, it became apparent that Lyndon would have to look at ways to raise revenue to maintain the quality of life you are used to and have come to expect from our City. Costs have gone up, which are beyond our control. Sanitation contract is up 40%, Utilities up 35%, Police & Public Works Fleet 150%, City Insurance 50%, just to name a few. While we have money in reserves to cover the current fiscal year and maybe two more, in August, the City Council passed an Ordinance creating a 1% Occupational Tax. The population of Lyndon is estimated to double in size during the work week. Employees coming to work in Lyndon travel our roads, use our parks, and benefit from the protection of our Police department. We aim to improve our City with every budget, but rising costs and providing necessary services prevent us from taking on projects that propel our City into a more desirable place to live, work and play.

The projected revenue from this tax will more than cover our current costs and ensure stability for the future. We are in the process of several capital projects and now many more can finally be brought to the table. Several Lyndon streets are sub-standard width and in dire need of resurfacing. Paving those streets before taking the time to address drainage and poor initial design would be a waste of time and money. Engineering these changes will be costly and completing the vision will take more. You definitely know which streets I am referring to if you live on one of them. Sidewalks in Lyndon are either non-existent on many streets or are in desperate need of replacement. We have been budgeting properly for these issues over the years, but the additional revenue we expect to bring in will allow us to address these infrastructure deficiencies over several years instead of a decade of piecing projects together.

The City hosted its annual Fall Festival in early October at Robsion Park, proving to be another successful event. The weather was wonderful and the company was delightful. Fun was had by all who attended. During these events I am always reminded of how humbling it is to be your Mayor and honored to have your confidence.

## LONG TIME CITY EMPLOYEE RETIRES

On October 1st, Maury “Moe” Tischendorf retired from St. Matthews/Lyndon Fire and Lyndon Public Works. Moe joined Lyndon Fire in 1986 as a volunteer firefighter then was hired as a full-time firefighter in 1993. Since that wasn’t enough work for him already, he was hired by Mayor Barto in 1996 to work on our public works team. ## OCCUPATIONAL TAX

On August 28, 2023, Lyndon Council passed an Ordinance establishing an Occupational Tax of 1% for all wages earned within the City of Lyndon. This action falls in line with the majority of cities with a population of more than 10,000 within Metro Louisville. Beginning January 1, 2024, all businesses are required to begin withholding the 1% Occupational Tax, in addition to current Louisville Metro requirements. Payments to the City for the Occupational Tax are on a quarterly basis. All the forms are available on the city website: [www.cityoflyndon.org](http://www.cityoflyndon.org) under the “Business” tab. As stated in page 1, this tax will keep the city with a balanced budget to address the needs of the residents. Hopefully this inflation cools and costs will flatten. Until then, the City of Lyndon strives to deliver quality customer service and will continue to do so at best value for our residents. Additionally, this tax will ensure that your Property Taxes will not need to be raised. In fact, we aim to keep the lowest rate possible as we continue to be less than all Cities adjacent.
